Item	Virtual Classroom in school
Introduction	The 76th School in Sofia, Bulgaria provides the students who cannot attend regular classes for a certain period of time with live online consultations in VEDAMO Virtual Classroom. The real-time online catch-up sessions lead to better pupil's performance and parents' involvement.
	Often teachers, parents, and pupils have difficulties when the children have to catch up after being absent from class. Whenever children miss classes they have to call their teacher or their classmates' parents, which is also an inconvenience for the teachers. Some other challenges that they face are:
	 The information parents receive is often unreliable Teachers can not respond immediately Parents are not fully informed at all times The parents of sick children do not seek information regularly enough Pupils have a hard time catching up, which affects their grades.
	The school's management decided to start using a Virtual Classroom as a way to enhance pupil performance. This also decreased the stress levels of children who had to make up for what they had missed in class.
